### Kindergarten & Pre-K Registration/Information Night for the 2019-2020 School Year Thursday, January 24th from 6:30 – 8:00 p.m.

École Rocky Elementary School is a dual-track school offering both English and French Immersion Kindergarten programs to our students. All parents considering enrolling their children in one of next year's E.C.S. programs are encouraged to attend our information/registration night on Thursday, January 24th.

Children must be five (5) years of age on or before December 31, 2019 to be eligible to register for Kindergarten for the coming school year.

We will require a copy of your child's Birth Certificate before your child starts school in September. For your convenience, a photocopy can be made for you at the school. If you do not have your child's birth certificate you must sign a **Temporary Declaration** of Legal Name And Age form. The approximate cost of obtaining a birth certificate in Canada is \$40.00. In order to obtain an Alberta Birth Certificate, it is required that the legal parent or guardian provide the registry office with Valid Photo Identification and Court/Guardianship orders. Processing time varies, depending on whether Vital Statistics has the correct information on file at time of the original Registration of Birth.

Just a reminder École Rocky Elementary has an automated service for reporting student attendance.

We are asking parents/guardians to report student absences prior to 9:00 a.m. for the current day, as well as planned future absences via the internet or telephone 24 hours a day, 7 days a week (i.e. medical appointments, vacation, etc.). If you child is going to be late, please call it in as an <u>absence</u>. When he/she arrives at school, your child must come to the office for a late slip at which time their absence will be changed to "late."

This program allows parents/guardians to report their child's absence in advance, or before a cutoff time of 9:00 a.m. for the current day in one of two ways:

<u>The school's answering machine is no longer used to communicate messages</u> <u>from parents/guardians about attendance. Parents/guardians calling into the school</u> <u>with an attendance will be asked to call the Safe Arrival line.</u> <u>Please use one of the two methods mentioned to report your child(ren)'s absence.</u>

The Safe Arrival Program uses an automated notification system to contact parents/guardians who have not reported their child absent. The automated notification system will contact parents/ guardians at multiple contact numbers until one of the designated contact is reached. ### <u>AFTER SCHOOL</u> <u>TELEPHONE MESSAGES—IMPORTANT</u>



Parents/guardians are asked to make arrangements ahead of time with their child regarding after school activities. Send a note or write in your child's agenda explaining after school arrangements. In case of an urgent situation where after school plans need to change, contact the school as soon as possible. Please keep in mind it is sometimes difficult for office staff to get a message to your child, especially if the call is received when the final bell has rung, or if a class is outside or not in their classroom at the end of the day. Your assistance in this matter is greatly appreciated.

We do not allow students to use the school phones during the school day to make arrangements to play at a friend's house after school or change arrangements that parents have made for them. Please discuss this with your child.

### FinS (Fish In Classrooms)

Our grade three students are participating in the FinS program, that is, Fish in Schools. FinS is an Alberta based project to teach students about the trout life cycle and their habitat in both indoor and outdoor settings. Over the course of 4 to 5 months, our students will monitor the development of rainbow trout from egg to fry in our classroom aquarium. Our "eyed eggs" have arrived and will be hatching shortly.

Students have ample incentive to learn because they soon understand that survival of their fish depends on their ability to maintain a healthy environment in their aquarium. The class selects a release site for their fish with the assistance and approval of Alberta Environmental Protection (AEP) fisheries staff. Our class will also participate in the release of their fish to complete the program.

### WHAT IS BULLYING?

"Bullying is when someone repeatedly and on purpose says or does mean or hurtful things to another person who has a hard time defending himself or herself." Olweus Bully Prevention Program

What are the components of bullying behaviour?

- 1) Involves an aggressive behaviour
- 2) Typically involves a pattern of behaviour repeated over time
- 3) A physical, emotional and/or verbal imbalance of power or strength

### What are the types of bullying?

-direct (i.e. hitting, taunting, name calling) -indirect (rumors, exclusion, cyber bullying)

### What can we tell our children about bullying?

- 1. We will not bully others.
- 2. We will try to help students who are bullied.
- 3. We will try to include students who are left out.
- 4. If we know that somebody is being bullied, we will tell an adult at school and an adult at home.

It is important that we work together to end the cycle. Have open and frank discussions with your child.

### **BULLYING**

Bullying can happen at any time, at any age and any where. This is a problem that is not only the responsibility of the students and staff at École Rocky Elementary School, but the parents and the community as well. We thought that we would provide some useful information for parents in order to help create a "Bully Free Environment at École Rocky Elementary.

### HOW TO HELP IF YOUR CHILD IS HAVING BULLYING BEHAVIOURS:

- 1. When a child does something wrong, intervene, immediately with discipline not punishment. Discipline involves the child taking ownership of the problem (no excuses) and the child solving the problem or 'fixing' the problem through restitution, resolution or reconciliation. Restitution involves "fixing" what he/she did – replacing item, apologizing, etc. Resolution means to figure out a way to keep the incident from happening again – what can he/she change about his/her behaviour. Reconciliation is a process of healing with the person and can involve extending the hand of friendship to participate in a fun activity together or to help the other person with something.
- 2. Create opportunities to "do good". Provide opportunities for him/her to help a neighbour with yard work or a brother/sister with homework, or volunteer at a community/church activity.
- 3. Nurture empathy. It is important to be able to look at others' perspectives and to understand their feelings. This can be done by "putting ourselves in their place", processing their nonverbal and verbal cues and understanding their life experiences. This skill can be developed by asking questions on how you think someone might be feeling and why – discuss how to respond to help them, or use a TV show to discuss the feelings.
- 4. Teach friendship skills. It is important to help our child learn to be assertive, respectful and to relate to others in peaceful ways. A discussion about friendship can be prompted with the saying, "To have a friend, you must first be a friend." Ask your son/daughter what he/she values in a friend, make a list, and then encourage him/her to be living up to their list in being a good friend to others.
- 5. Closely monitor TV, Computer activities, and music. Be aware of all of the influences in our society for some may not be in agreement with your value system. In addition, to much media involvement and too little "real life" social interaction and engagement stifle the development of social skills necessary to relate in a caring, responsible way.
- 6. Engage in more constructive, entertaining, and energizing activities. Children's' needs can be met in a healthier, appropriate, way of a fun activity; rather than the hurt of bully-ing someone.
- 7. Teach your child to "will good". Encouraging our children to have moral integrity to do what is right even in difficult situations.

### AFTER SCHOOL MESSAGES

Just a reminder to parents/guardians to write down after school arrangements in agendas for teachers. We have been getting a lot of repeat phone calls to give messages to students at the end of the day which is disruptive to classroom learning.

### HOW TO HELP IF YOUR CHILD IS BEING BULLIED:

Parenting is always a challenge. When our children are upset our emotions seem to automatically "kick-in"; therefore, it is important to, first, calm down and be in control of your own emotions. Caution yourself not to let your own personal bullying experiences from your past influence your ability to help. Be careful that you don't take over to try to 'solve' the problem; this sends the message that your child is not strong enough to handle the situation on his or her own. It is also important to not send a blaming message by asking questions like, "What did you do wrong? What are you doing to cause this?" The following provides some strategies for parents to support their child when they are upset:

- + Be a good listener. Listen without the distraction of computer, newspaper, phone, etc.
- Ask questions that invite more information such as, "What happened next?" or "What did you do?"
- Listen to the whole story encouraging him/her to share details. Allowing your child to share the details allowing him/her to vent and get out the story can be therapeutic.
- Repeat back what you are hearing your child share. This can help clarify the situation. Example "So you're saying that the girls wouldn't allow you to sit with them and they told you do not ever sit with them again."
- Give your child a hug.
- Don't over-empathize empower him or her. Compliment their abilities. Ex. "I know that this is hard. You're amazing; to be able to express yourself about this."
- Ask if he or she can think of something to say or do that would be helpful. Encourage assertiveness. Role-play for practice. Help him/her rehearse the messages in his/her head to build confidence.

If an isolated incident occurs, show your child support and encourage him or her to figure out her own solutions. If the behaviour occurs a second or third time, he or she needs to act on his or her own behalf. When bullying persists or is extreme, it's time to intervene. Don't take action behind your child's back, if you're going to make contact with the school, make sure your child knows ahead of time.



# Family Literacy Fact Sheet

Family literacy refers to the many ways families develop and use literacy skills, from enjoying a storybook together, to playing word games, singing, writing to a relative or friend, sharing day-to-day tasks such as making a shopping list or using a recipe, and surfing the Internet.

Parents' literacy skills and their ability to engage with their children in ways that encourage literacy at an early age have a lasting and far-reaching impact on children's language development, future success in school and well being throughout their lives. Having a parent read aloud helps children learn listening, vo-cabulary and language skills, and develop imagination and creativity. Additionally, it's important for adults to continue exercising their reading abilities at all stages of their lives.

48 per cent of adult Canadians have low literacy skills that fall below high school equivalency and affect their ability to function at work and in their personal lives. 17 per cent function at the lowest level, where individuals may, for example, be unable to read the dosage instructions on a medicine bottle. (<u>OECD Programme for the International Assessment of Adult Competencies</u>\*, 2013).

Over half (54.7 per cent) of adult Canadians score in the two lowest skill levels in numeracy, up from 49.8 percent in 2003. People with inadequate literacy skills are more likely to be unemployed than those who scored higher. (Skills in Canada: First Results from the Programme for the International Assessment of Adult Competencies (PIAAC)\* – Statistics Canada, 2013).

Parents' reading habits play a large role in determining how often kids read: 57 per cent of kids who are frequent readers have parents who read books 5–7 days per week, compared to only 15 per cent of kids who are infrequent readers. (Kids and Family Reading Report – Scholastic, 2017).

Nine in 10 kids and parents say they enjoy/enjoyed read-aloud time, and parents of children ages 0–5 cite reading books aloud, telling stories and talking together as among the most important things parents should do with their children to develop language skills. (Kids and Family Reading Report – Scholastic, 2017).

- Higher reading proficiency by age 15 is associated with higher levels of education attainment, lower levels of unemployment and higher average income levels by age 25. (Education Matters: Insights on Education, Learning and Training in Canada Statistics Canada, 2011).
- Child development researchers agree: children's symbolic play (where an object is used as a stand-in for another object, such as a wooden block representing a car) correlates to cognitive and language development (Edward Fisher, 1992).
- Family play doesn't just encourage reading: a study in the Journal of Music Therapy found that singing correlates with increased language development, math ability and overall improved school grades (1999).

\*The 2013 Programme for the International Assessment of Adult Competenties surveyed adults between the aged of 16 and 65 not residing in institutions or on Aboriginal reserves. It also excludes families of members of the Armed Forces living on military bases as well as residents of some sparsely populated areas.

### **Family Literacy**



Taking time every day to read or do a learning activity with children is crucial to a child's development.

Family literacy programs focus on parents as the means to improve the reading and writing skills of all family members. By reading to children and engaging in fun literacy activities, parents are actively keeping their own skills sharp while at the same time strengthening the relationship between the family which, in turn, encourages lifelong learning. Schools in the Wild Rose School Division will stay open all day on regularly scheduled school days regardless of the weather, providing that the building is deemed safe and comfortably heated. The primary consideration in the event of severe weather conditions shall be the health and safety of students. Parents are expected to exercise good judgement and care when deciding whether or not to send their child(ren) to school when weather conditions are extreme.

The following radio stations are designated to receive information in the area served by Wild Rose Public Schools:

- In the North part of the Division CFCW 790 AM, and CIBW-FM 92.9 FM.
- In the South part of the Division BIG 105 FM and CKGY 95.5 FM and BIG WEST 94.5 FM.

When buses do not run, and parents choose to deliver the child to school, the parent shall also be responsible for ensuring safe transportation home for the student. It is necessary for children to wear warm clothing (outer) during cold weather, including appropriate footwear. Parents are asked to use good judgment and care when deciding whether or not to send their child(ren) when weather conditions are extreme or when there is danger of roads being blocked. When a route will not operate, the schools are contacted by fax prior to 8 a.m., the information is posted on the website (www.wrsd.ca) and the driver is expected to call parents of the students on his/her route. A free transportation App is also available on the www.wrsd.ca website. The app is available for Android and iPhone users and can be downloaded at the <u>iTunes store</u> or <u>Google Play</u>.
